Richardson - Zah COVID-19 Fund Offers Relief to Diné Families

Established April 2020 in partnership with the New Mexico Children's Foundation, **The Governor Bill Richardson – Peterson Zah COVID-19 Navajo Families Relief Fund** has raised almost **\$275,000** to purchase and deliver vital supplies of nitrile gloves, face shields, 3-ply masks, and hand sanitizer to locations in New Mexico, including Crownpoint, Church Rock, Huerfano, and Nageezi. With additional partner, Molina Healthcare, the Fund is dedicated to supporting the immediate health care needs to tribal clinics, hospitals, non-profits, and needs of families on the Navajo Nation due to the pandemic.

Grants Awarded for 2020-2021:

Assistance League of Chaves County, \$1500, *Roswell*. Supports two programs for elementary students in need. K-8th grade students are brought to chapter house to “shop” for brand new clothing and leave with a bag of new clothes, shoe vouchers, books, wide grins, and a renewed sense of confidence.

Bookkids, \$1500, *Santa Fe*. Promotes literacy and the love of reading by providing books for Santa Fe public school children to own and enjoy. Schools are selected based on student need.

Bridges Project for Education, \$2000, *Taos*. Provides counseling and support for students, especially those who are first generation in their families to pursue postsecondary education.

Camp Enchantment New Mexico, \$2500, *Albuquerque*. \$2500, Serves ages 7 to 17, who have experienced cancer and serves approximately 75 children in treatment or in survivorship from cancer at Manzano Mountain Retreat for Camp Enchantment.

Cancer Services of New Mexico \$1500, *Albuquerque*. The largest general cancer education program in New Mexico and the largest program of its type in the United States serving young children and teens.

CASA, Court Appointed Special Advocates, First Judicial District, \$4000, *Santa Fe, Rio Arriba and Los Alamos Counties*. Provides advocacy for abused children in juvenile proceedings and trains volunteers to serve as advocates for children in foster care.

Common Bond New Mexico Foundation \$2000, *Albuquerque*. To keep kids safe, we immediately switched our previously in-person meetings to a digital platform. We now continue supporting our youth with U-21 Online. This digital safe space uses several social media, gaming, and video conferencing tools. We can continue to support our kids with check-ins and online social activities.

Compassionate Touch Network, \$2000, *Albuquerque, Rio Rancho & Santa Fe*. Trains facilitators for classroom presentations on mental illness. Aims to recognize its symptoms, to get appropriate treatment, to understand the importance of early diagnosis and treatment and to promote compassion without stigma.

ELEVATE, \$500, *Santa Fe*. This Health and Wellness Program is an educational enrichment program which fosters a growth mindset in children, uses rock climbing as a way of solidifying these lessons and skills.

El Pueblo de Abiquiu Library & Cultural Center \$4000, *Abiquiu*. Teaches local youth to care about their betterment and that of their families. Involving youth in local job development is a key learning experience.

El Rito Public Library, \$4000, *El Rito*. Toddlers and their caregivers are invited to the *STEM to Read* pre-literacy program; the goal is to develop literacy and scientific thinking by active, engaged learning activities.

Embudo Valley Library, \$3300, *Dixon*. Adjusting to COVID-safe formats; over 9 wks, supplied 430 Grab’N Go kits, and hosted two outdoor events and two on-line multi-day workshops (stop-action animation & teen writing)

Embudo Valley Tutoring Association, \$4000, *Dixon*. Provides free tutoring to strengthen the educational opportunities for children in the rural area surrounding the Rio Grande Valley of Rio Arriba County.

Fathers New Mexico, \$2000, *Santa Fe*. Focuses on the role of father, developing strategies through group discussion and programming to support healthy fatherhood.

Friends of the Espanola Library, \$1000, *Espanola*. Fosters a love of reading among 2,600 preschoolers.

Gila Valley Library, \$3000, *Gila Valley, Grant County*. NMCF made it possible for academic plans to continue, reaching students through virtual programming. Students were offered instruction on insects, metamorphosis, bridge building, and motion and physics, from highly qualified field experts and educators.

High Mountain Youth Project, \$3000, *Ruidoso*. Adopted a policy for the reopening of the Drop-in Center to students according to NM Dept of Health and CDC guidelines. Our staff transformed the Evening Drop-in & Study Center program into a day program to accommodate our most academically at-risk students.

Imagination Library of Luna County, \$1500, *Deming*. Provides age appropriate books, by mail, free of charge, to preschool children from birth until they turn five years of age.

Kirtland Youth Association, \$4000, *Kirkland and San Juan County*. Offers all-day summer recreation, literacy and mathematic skill development programs with breakfast and lunch provided.

Literacy Links - Leamos, \$2500, *Silver City*. Provides and delivers free schoolbooks to school age children.

Locker #505 Students Clothing Bank, \$1500, *Albuquerque*. Provides appropriate school clothing to K-12 Bernalillo County students in need.

Many Mothers, \$3000, *Santa Fe*. We started an **Adopt a Family** program, pairing volunteers with income-eligible families that had intense needs. *A total of 16 families were supported by 15 volunteers, who were happy to gift each family with warm clothes, educational toys for the family's babies and children, plus a gift for the mother.*

NM Lions Operation KidSight, Inc., \$3000, *Las Cruces*. In this extraordinary year, welcome funds from NMCF were used to cover the vision services for 8-18 year old students. Without the grant funds, we would have had to deny those students the vision care they needed.

Northern Youth Project, \$4000, *Abiquiú*. Programs supports opportunities for rural Northern New Mexico youth providing FREE programs and activities year-round through hands-on art, agriculture, community service, and leadership projects.

Santa Fe Alliance for Science, \$3000, *Santa Fe*. Provides STEM enrichment activities in schools, interacts one-on-one with thousands of students at school.

STEM Santa Fe, \$2000, *Santa Fe and Northern New Mexico*. Hosted a virtual conference for 5th to 8th grade girls to encourage young women to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

Valencia County Literacy Council, \$4000, *Los Lunas*. A family literacy pre-school provides child-centered instruction to develop literacy in children up to five years with parents reading daily to their children and staff providing a lending library and numerous educational activities.

Villa Therese Catholic Clinic, \$4000, *Santa Fe*. The Clinic, staffed by volunteers and paid staff, provides integrated children's medical and dental services for the uninsured.

Wings for L.I.F.E., \$3500, *Roswell & surrounding areas*. Provides an afterschool program that promotes positive behaviors to reduce risk-taking behaviors and serves as a prevention program to prevent young children and youth from becoming involved in the juvenile justice system.
