Dear Friends,

Twenty-five years ago, my mother, Alice King, realized her vision to help the children of New Mexico by establishing the New Mexico Children's Foundation. The Foundation has supported thousands of children and their families with grants to more than 160 organizations, primarily to small, grassroots groups, which work to make their communities better for our children. NMCF has accomplished this without government funds by raising money from the private sector, which is given in grants to deserving non-profits for programs directly benefiting local children.

As President of the Board of NMCF, I am excited to have the opportunity to carry on my mother's passion for uplifting New Mexico's children. In many communities, the need is more desperate now than it was 25 years ago.

We celebrated the 25th Anniversary beginning with special proclamations from the New Mexico Legislature and a birthday party to thank everyone who has served on our Board of Directors. We could not have been as successful as we have without the countless hours of service donated by our Board members. Last fall we held a very special gala and benefit concert with Taj Mahal and Keb' Mo' at the Santa Fe Opera. Alice would have loved the music and fun. In December we had High Tea for the holidays at the Ranchers Club in Albuquerque, an elegant way to complete our special year.

In honor of our 25th Anniversary, some very special anonymous donors offered a challenge to match each dollar we raised in 2017 up to \$50,000. I am delighted to announce that we raised over \$71,000! The \$50,000 match will be deposited in the Alice King Endowment Fund to support the work of the New Mexico Children's Foundation for years to come by increasing annual earnings we are able to donate to worthy organizations.

In recognition of our 25th we gave a record number of grants to thirty-nine organizations totaling \$73,500. Our grant cycle for 2018-2019 will begin with our Grant Application Guidelines which can be found on our website at www.nmchildren.org. The deadline for applications is March 9, 2018.

In the coming year our Trustees will be holding a retreat to update and develop our strategic plan for the future. My goals include expansion of our statewide presence and building on our special anniversary to significantly increase our support of New Mexico children.

All we do is made possible by our generous donors. Thank you for caring about the children of New Mexico and supporting Alice's vision to improve the lives of New Mexico's children.

WHAT YOUR DONATIONS FUND

Our mission statement is to support small programs state-wide that serve the physical, mental, educational and social needs of children and their families. Most of the programs we fund address multiple needs and the nonprofits featured in this article have different approaches to serving children. All have budgets below \$300,000 and most are below \$100,000. Our small grants have great impact for these organizations that rely on a minimum of paid staff that are augmented by volunteers.

The First Tee of Southeastern New Mexico provides a summer camp program that uses golf as vehicle to teach core values of honesty, integrity, sportsmanship, respect, responsibility, courtesy, perseverance, judgement and confidence. Participants are partnered with trained coaches to learn the basics of golf and core values. NMCF funding was "an integral part of making the program a success and giving these young people an opportunity to experience a sport that will keep them healthy and active throughout life as well as reinforcing the importance of the 9 Core Values in their day to day lives, both on and off the golf course."







Literacy Links in Silver City distributed 9,902 age appropriate books to Grant County school children this fall. A fourth grade teacher writes: *On behalf of my fourth grade students, I thank Literacy Links for their ongoing support of reading and children. When chil-*



dren see books as gifts and as treasured objects to own, their love of reading gets a boost. This is critical for students from lower social economic status. Unlike others, they may have never been to a bookstore and thus have not felt the excitement of the world of book ownership. In a few homes these books make up most a child's book collection. As you know, books in homes have been linked to improved literacy.

The smiles and enthusiasm that the opportunity to select books brings to children is priceless. Books are donated by the First Book National Book Bank and Literacy Link pays for shipping and handling fees. Volunteers catalogue and distribute these books.

Northern Youth Project of Rio Arriba County

The summer and fall program, Mentoring Youth through Leadership in Art and Agriculture connects rural youth of Abiquiu and the area with the wealth of talent and knowledge the community has to offer in the areas of arts and land-based agricultural traditions, while connecting teens to diverse cultural heritage resources and contemporary societal issues and environmental issues.

A total of 165 children participated in the garden and arts program that included cooking classes, garden tours, gourd making, mural creation, design classes, micaceous pottery workshops, t-shirt dying, farm and garden programming. The project used teen interns and provided mentorship to these young leaders. The Garden Open House, Plant Sale and Seed Exchange and Harvest Brunch collectively invited community participants to celebrate teen leadership accomplishments.





Food Bank of Eastern New Mexico

According to the most recent Feeding America report released last summer, 124,980 or 25% of New Mexico Children are at risk of hunger in New Mexico. Our state is tied for second place for childhood hunger. The Food Bank provides more than 470 students in 17 schools a food bag each weekend with its Backpack Program. These students have been identified by educators as being in danger of not having food on weekends away from school. In addition the Food Bank provides monthly food boxes as part of the Feeding Families Program.

Boys and Girls Club of Bloomfield, New Mexico

With funds from NMCF, the Club has provided youth the opportunity to participate in various programs geared toward healthy eating and exercise as well as afterschool activities to support academic success. **Power Hour** supports youth with homework and tutoring and the Club's reading program allows youth a safe, quiet space to focus on literacy and motivates youth to explore interests. This fall, when the Bloomfield Executive Director resigned, the Boys & Girls Club of Farmington stepped in to assist during the on-going transition demonstrating shared commitment for children to have a safe and nurturing environment . The Boys and Girls Club of Bloomfield is the ONLY youth organization in Bloomfield. The Club serves approximately 840 youth with three-fourths of the youth the Club serves classified as "at-risk" for a variety of reasons, including income, family status, and problems at school at home or law enforcement.

New Mexico Kids Matter, Bernalillo County

This project provides Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) for Native American Children who are in foster care due to child abuse and neglect in Bernalillo County. There are currently 250 Native American children in foster care in the Albuquerque metropolitan area and there is a need for services focused on the special needs of these children and the legal requirements that apply when Native American children are taken into foster care. These children find themselves in a world filled with social workers, lawyers, judges and courtrooms where life-altering decisions are made on their behalf and they are often re-traumatized by a child welfare system that is foreign to them and their parents. Not only being separated from their families but they also face a disconnection from their cultural needs. New Mexico Kids Matter through CASAs and other resources seeks to help these children.

High Mountain Youth Project in Ruidoso, Lincoln County

A few years ago a group of concerned community members became alarmed by the growing number of homeless students. Homeless students are 87% more likely than their peers to leave school, making homelessness the highest risk factor in determining if a student leaves school before graduation. In addition these youth are more likely to be exposed to sexual trafficking, abuse, hunger and denial of their basic needs. Through collaboration with the schools, social service programs & agencies, businesses, faith-based groups, and other agencies who support at risk youth in the region, an Evening Drop In Center for high school youth opened at the beginning of this year. Students are able to access free resources that help them have better attendance, increased academic performance and graduate with their peers. The Evening program offers a quiet place for homework and rest, access to computers, school supplies, assistance with homework, laundry facilities, showers, evening meals, counseling, and other support services in a positive environment with trained caring adults.
